

Weststar aviation services aiming for at least RM10b contract value by year-end

SINGAPORE: Weststar Aviation Services Sdn Bhd (Weststar), a subsidiary of the Weststar Group, is aiming for at least RM10 billion worth of contracts by expanding its offshore helicopter transportation services to the oil and gas companies by year-end.

Chief Executive Officer Tan Sri Muhammad Ismail Jamalluddin said the company would provide two helicopters to an oil and gas company in Morocco next month as the next plan of the company's expansion programme.

He said the company signed contracts in Thailand last month to supply six helicopters and was planning to expand services in Morocco next month.

"We are also in the bidding process to win contracts in Mozambique," he told a media conference after signing an agreement for 10 AW139 intermediate twin helicopters with Agusta Westland, an Italy-based helicopter maker, here Tuesday.

Muhammad Ismail said currently the company has eight billion ringgit worth of contracts.

The AW139 helicopters make up the

majority of the Weststar Aviation Services fleet, he said, adding that "we have enjoyed a stellar track record."

"As Weststar Aviation Services is now moving forward in its international expansion efforts, we are delighted and confident to further cement Agusta Westland as our preferred helicopter partner," he said.

Muhammad Ismail said the company would receive its first AW139 three helicopters by the first quarter of this year.

Weststar is the first helicopter services operator worldwide chosen to benefit from the commonality in design across the entire AW139 family new generation helicopters.

Asked why Weststar picked the AW139 model, Muhammad Ismail said the model not only has the same high performance flight characteristics and safety features but also shared a common cockpit layout, design philosophy and maintenance concepts like AW169 and AW189, which are bigger than AW139.

Weststar's oil and gas clients include Petronas Carigali, ExxonMobil, Carigali Hess, Talisman, Shell and Mubadala Petroleum. - Bernama
